Allergies

Allergies happen when a pet's immune system overreacts to foreign substances (Allergens or antigens) they are exposed to. Your pet must have been sensitized (exposed) to something and then become hypersensitive (allergic), that is their body reacts overly compared to another animal. These over – reactions can show as:

- Skin itchiness and inflammation - localised or all over the body.
- Respiratory – coughing, sneezing or wheezing.
- Digestive – vomiting and / or diarrhoea

Many things can be allergens e.g. drugs, toxins, proteins, foods, venom, pollens, mould, feathers and dander.

A severe reaction is called anaphylaxis and this is a serious, life threatening state of shock due to hypersensitivity.

Unfortunately, it is not possible even for your vet to look at your pet and know what is causing the allergy. There are both immediate and delayed reactions to allergens in all animals. This makes it difficult to work out what your pet is reacting to. The most common type of allergy is an inhalant allergy, called atopy.

When people breathe in allergens, they are sensitive to (such as pollens from grass, other plants, moulds and dust mites), they tend to get watery eyes, a runny nose and sneeze.

Dogs that are allergic (even to the same inhaled allergies) more commonly will be very itchy and have dermatitis (skin problems). Some allergy problems can be seasonal with your pet only itching when allergen (often a seasonally pollen / plant) is around. Most pets start off with seasonal problems that over time get worse and they seem to itch all year round.

Dogs with allergies may chew, lick or scratch almost any part of their bodies, but most commonly their feet. Saliva will stain light coloured hair so dogs that lick excessively may have reddish, brown stained hair on their paws. It is tempting to think pets with allergies to food will have vomiting and diarrhoea but mostly they itch, usually all over, but particularly

cats will be itchy on their face. Dogs are more likely to have recurring ear problems secondary to allergies and itchy feet. Some pets have a genetic predisposition to allergies - especially atopy.

Contact dermatitis may be due to irritants or allergy. suspect contact dermatitis if the skin that is itchy and inflamed is the sparsely haired parts of the body such as the muzzle, lips, ventral abdomen and perineum. Often there is a sharp line between normal hair covered and inflamed bare skin. Substances that cause contact dermatitis are:

- plants
- medicines (e.g. antibiotic creams)
- shampoos
- flea products
- fibres (wood and synthetics)
- disinfectants and detergents

Dogs with grass allergies are actually allergic to pollen from grass not the blades of grass, it is pollen in air they breathe in which is problem - so keeping grass short so it doesn't pollinate does help, preferably in the whole neighbourhood.

Food allergies often develop in young dogs. It is wise to be suspicious of a food allergy in a young dog (under 6 months) that has severe itchiness, (because it takes over 6 months to develop atopy). Any breed can be affected. Any type of skin lesion may be caused by food allergy – but it is always itchy. In most cases the ears, feet, axillae (underarms) and distal limbs and groin are affected; often there is secondary bacterial or Malassezia infection.

Food intolerance is a too common problem. Most food allergies in dogs are to chicken, beef, dairy products. Other common problems are corn, soy, eggs, chicken and rice. Although food additives (including preservatives) are often blamed, they have not been proved to cause food hypersensitivities in dogs and cats. Ideally, identifying the foods that can't be tolerated will allow avoidance of them so bowel and skin problems don't occur.

Flea allergy dermatitis occurs when your pet is hypersensitive (allergic) to protein allergens injected into the skin when a flea bites your pet. There is both immediate and delayed (24hrs to 10 days after the bite) reactions. Affected pets may have only 1 or 2 (if any) fleas but a lot of reaction to any flea. Often a flea will jump on a pet, bite, jump off and the pet is still itching days later, and you can't find any fleas. Dogs with flea allergies often have allergies to other problems as well.

Allergy testing

Ideally, if you can identify the allergen your pet is allergic to and avoid it, then that is your best way of helping your pet. Unfortunately, this is easier said than done. Remember, most pets are allergic to more than one thing. If you reduce exposure to some of the things your pet is

allergic to, this will help. Even if you can't keep them away from everything they over react to, you can control what they eat, so this is a good way to reduce allergenic load. Any reduction in allergenic exposure helps reduce itchiness and helps your pet feel better.

Allergies can be tested for using a blood sample [sent to the laboratory in USA] or a hair sample (done by a naturopath) or skin testing done by a specialist dermatologist ; routine laboratory tests are not helpful with allergies, except to rule out other problems and monitor any medications your pet needs to be on.

Food elimination diet can be used to work out what foods are problems. To do this you need to select a protein source your pet has never been fed before (so will not be allergic to) e.g. Kangaroo, fish, duck or pork and a carbohydrate source you pet has never been fed before e.g. potato, pumpkin, sweet potato, barley or porridge (beware many kibbles contain rice so they are unsuitable). Feed nothing else for 4 weeks (minimum, ideally 6-10 weeks) then challenge your pet with one new food each week – there is usually a problem within 24 hours of eating a food that your pet can't tolerate – e.g. diarrhoea, may be bloody diarrhoea, increase in itchiness, wheals, welts on skin or pustules on the skin. Alternately there is a commercial food that you can use – Royal Canin Hypoallergenic/An allergenic where the protein molecules are too small to be recognised as allergens. In the same way it is best to feed nothing else for a minimum of 4 weeks and then add one new food a week to work out what your pet can tolerate.

The signs of improvement you are looking for with an elimination diet, is a decrease in itchiness or decrease in gastrointestinal disturbances. Some dogs with food allergies are also allergic to fleas or have atopy so may only partially improve – so response is evaluated if itchiness decrease and then diagnosis is confirmed if challenge by feeding normal diet or suspected allergen and signs (itchiness or gut problem) get worse.

If you can't be hard hearted enough to restrict your pet's diet, then it is best to have allergy testing done. It is best to feed a strict diet and allow only water and the limited diet to enter the dogs mouth. Many people can't manage this.

Food that you can often get away with e.g. to hide tablets in, while on a restricted diet are eggs, devon and vegemite. Beware of raw hide chews as many dogs are allergic to them. Your diet won't work if you give vitamins in cheese and your pet is allergic to dairy products.

Some pets with digestive allergy signs will do well on a high fibre diet e.g. adding Weetabix to their diet. Some pets will do well on chicken and rice – but this is not a balanced diet and can only be fed short term, not for life. A vitamin supplement is advisable if on a restricted diet.

Often when a pet is suspected of having a food allergy that affects the gastrointestinal tract, the first step is to reduce the antigenic load and increase the fibre in the pet's diet. Flagyl tablets will reduce the antigenic load and also suppress cell mediated cellular responses and it also has antiprotozoal and antibacterial benefits, so is very useful initially. Probiotics e.g.

Protexin added to the diet help balance the bugs in the bowel and are also very useful. If the food allergy is mainly affecting the skin [with itchiness and skin rashes] then often a suitable antibiotic is given for secondary bacterial infections and antihistamine and cortisone to relieve the itchiness initially.

It is best to discuss food allergies with your vet as often there are other allergies as well to consider or other underlying disease problems. Antibiotics or antifungal treatments may be needed to control secondary infections before a change in itchiness can be properly assessed.

Be very restrictive with your elimination diet from the start to save having to repeat it and within a few months your pet's problems can be significantly reduced.

Treatment

Treatment of allergies where it is not possible to eliminate or avoid the allergens

1. Anti-inflammatory drugs.

This works well short term. Anti-inflammatory therapy will dramatically block the allergic reaction in most cases but only while your pet is taking the medication.

- **Corticosteroids** may be given orally or by injection if your pet is difficult to give tablets to. If steroids are appropriate for your dog, you will be instructed in their proper use. Corticosteroids do have side effects so are not a good choice for recurring problems or long term. Cortisone will cause your pet to drink more and urinate more but also lower their immunity so they are more prone to infection and other problems and can change their behaviour.
- **Antihistamines** can be of value in treating the allergic dog when they are combined with steroids, note this is best short term. In some dogs, antihistamines can significantly decrease the amount of steroid needed to provide relief. These work well in humans but are very poorly effective in dogs. Antihistamines do not work well in dogs on their own only when combined with other drugs. They really only work when at a high enough dose to sedate.
- **Fatty acid supplementation** can also be implemented with steroids and antihistamines. Fatty acids are also
- known as omega 3 (fish oil). Omega 6 (evening primrose oil) And omega 9 oils (olive oil, sunflower, canola oil). The only essential fatty acid is omega 3 so it is best on to supplement.

When the three of them are combined, most allergic dogs are significantly improved. This is a non-specific approach which does not treat the allergy, only the result of the allergic state (itching). However, the dose of the fish oil that dog's need to relieve itchiness is very high: 1000mg / 5kg / day. Krill oil is also effective, and capsules are smaller and easier to give.

2. Shampoo therapy.

Many dogs are helped considerably by frequent bathing with a **hypoallergenic shampoo** (e.g. oatmeal aloveen). It has been demonstrated that some allergens may be absorbed through the skin. Frequent bathing is thought to reduce the amount of antigen exposure through this route. In addition to removing surface antigen, bathing alone will provide some temporary relief from itching and may allow the use of a lower dose of steroids. Some of the hypoallergenic shampoos incorporate fatty acids; these may be absorbed through the skin and offer a localised anti-inflammatory action. The role of the fatty acids in allergy treatment is an area of active research interest in veterinary medicine. Anything that improves the skins barriers is helpful in reducing itchiness.

3. Hypersensitisation.

This is the best option if possible. A blood sample is collected and sent to lab for testing. Once testing identifies the specific allergens, very small amounts of the antigen are injected weekly or oral liquid daily. The purpose of this therapy is to reprogram the body's immune system. Over 6 plus months, the immune system will become less reactive to the problem-causing allergens. For most dogs, a realistic goal is for the itching to be significantly reduced in severity; in some dogs, itching may completely resolve. Generally, steroids are only used on a brief and intermittent basis. This therapeutic approach is recommended for the middle-aged or older dog that has year-round itching caused by inhalant allergy. It is very affective in over 80% of dogs

4. Antibiotics.

Dogs that damage their skin by licking, chewing and scratching are quite susceptible to bacterial infections in the skin. If this occurs, antibiotics should be given until the infection is controlled. The skin infection itself can be quite irritating and cause a dog to itch even more. Some dogs get a Malassezia or yeast type of infection, which needs an antifungal tablet often as well as antibiotic.

5. Atopica (cyclosporin)

This takes a little longer to work than cortisone (usually about 2 weeks to see improvement) but is better for long term use. It is best given on an empty stomach. It is given daily initially, then after the first month, this decreases to every second day and individuals often need only 1 to 2 times a week, long term. After the second month, twice a week is usually enough. It is more expensive initially than cortisone, but it works well and has less side effects.

6. Cytopoint

This is an injection given every 1-2 months (sometimes less often depending on your pets' requirements). It is a very effective and very minimal risk of side effects. Cytopoint blocks triggers to itchiness.

7. Apoquel

Apoquel is a tablet. It gives fast effective relief of itchiness caused by allergies (atopy). It has very minimal side effects so is good for long term use. It does wear off over 24 hours so needs to be given daily.

8. Food


A food elimination diet is very useful. At least 30% of dogs with atopy also have food allergies. Daily omega 3 oil (fish oil) or other essential fatty acids also helps relieve itchiness. The dose of fish oil needed is 1000mg / 5kg body weight / day. So, a 20kg dog needs 2 x 2000mg capsules or 4 x 1000mg capsules each day.

9. Flea control

Flea control is important with an allergic dog because they often are allergic to fleas as well as other things (pollens, food, etc). You rarely see any fleas on an allergic dog, but they need barrier protection to stop any fleas jumping on them.

8. Topical creams / ointments / sprays.

Things applied to the skin to relieve pain, and itchiness can be really useful in allergies. Talk to your vet about how best to help your pet.

Born in November 2020 Piper has gone through three owners and three litters in her lifetime. The only paperwork that came with her was from the original owner.



Thanks to Rosemary Duffy and a neighbour, this cycle has now been broken .
